
where they are on that journey, and offer them choices of religious, cultural, political, and social opportunities to learn, participate, grow and enjoy.

LISTENING, LEARNING, AND ENGAGING



Through connecting, 1-on-1 with several of these students and listening to what they were missing, I discovered that they all knew each other but all were hungry for an opportunity to connect to the Judaism they knew from Israel. Working together we created a group chat where we are updating and adding new Israeli students from both campuses, twice a term we brought Israeli students from UO up to Corvallis so we could all speak in Hebrew, cook incredible food, tell jokes and spend time connecting with our Israeli roots.

support student leadership development, we are excited to launch our new leadership platform, the Duck Leadership Network. The Duck Leadership Network will connect students with Hillel professionals to provide 1-on-1 mentorship and to connect them with other students who share similar passions or who can co-collaborate on bringing an initiative or idea to life. We want to enable & empower students to innovate and create a community they are truly excited about while also gaining hands-on experience they can utilize in their future endeavors.

One of the most important lessons I've learned over this past year is that true engagement takes time, compassion, and a great deal of listening. Whenever I meet a new student, the most important thing I can do is to listen so that I can learn about what each student is most passionate about, understand where they spend their time, and what they are missing. Listening provides us with a road map to understand how Hillel can connect and inspire our students to define and lead their Jewish community. I have been so grateful to have had the opportunity to meet so many amazing students at both UO and OSU through 1-on-1 connections and meetings. These personal connections are one of the most powerful experiences for our students and they enable us to learn how we can invest in our students to lead and build their community and network.

Taking a listen first approach (and not being in "sales mode") we have been able to create new networks for our students to engage. This past year, I was able to table at Oregon State for Sukkot and meet a group of Israeli students. As an Israeli (living in Tel Aviv until I was 12 and then moving to the US) I was SO excited to connect with these



This approach has also helped us to re-imagine our student leadership model at the University of Oregon. Through strategically reaching out to Jewish student leaders throughout campus we learned a great deal about the importance of mentorship and the value it has with our students. As an organization, we are here to cultivate students ideas and bring them to life, and we take great pride in providing opportunities to equip students with as much personal and professional experience so that they are ready to step into leadership roles following graduation. To better

It is never a dull moment at Oregon Hillel, and I am so grateful and privileged to spend my days with such amazing students. From helping them move their furniture to a new apartment and delivering them a bowl of soup, to helping them navigate the challenges of the world around us, I am here to support each and every student. Being a support system to students at the University of Oregon has been the greatest gift and experience I could ask for.



The past year provided a large number of opportunities for students to learn, to grow, and to flourish. At Oregon Hillel, our Shalom Hartman Fellowship, as well as through our sui generis relationship with UO's Judaic Studies program 61 students experienced one of two term-long academic courses, an immersive Israel learning experience, or some combination of all three. I will briefly summarize each one and then expand on aspirations for next steps in expanding and deepening opportunities.

Winter term class—Medieval Judaism—is a survey of Jewish history in the medieval period with a brief overview of the cultural context which preceded it and the Early Modern Period which succeeded it. The class examined some of the central themes and patterns in Jewish history. We focused on the development of major Jewish communities both in Christian Europe and the Muslim world, observing essential similarities and differences for Jewish life within the two. Particular attention was given to the relationship between Jewish and non-Jewish communities, the construction of Jew as “other”, and the genesis of anti-Semitism. The class also analyzed 21st century in America on both the left and the right, and analyzed its roots in Medieval Islam and Christianity.

Spring term class—American Jewish Experience (AJE) served as an exploration of Jewish History in the United States. AJE examined the development of the community, demographic diversity, and internal tensions. We utilized a pedagogic framework to understand the realia of daily and communal life for Jews and Judaism. Students came to understand American Judaism as the center point within movement of three vectors: (1) American history, (2) Jewish history, and (3) history of American religion. The class paid close attention to various waves of antisemitism and anti-Jewish sentiment prevalent from the first Jews moving to the American colonies (specifically to Colony of New Holland later New York, in 1654) until today.

Hartman iEngage Fellowship—this academic year The Oregon Hillel Foundation doubled our participation bringing 4 Beavers and 4 Ducks to an immersive learning experience the Shalom Hartman Institute in Jerusalem. I was blessed to spend a little more than a week with our students studying about open dialogue, difference, and disagreements—the most essential ideas at the heart of our civil society both as Jews and as Americans. The fellowship included a book club (Yossi Klein HaLevi's tour de force *Like Dreamers*) and learning sessions both before and after the in-person experience.

Aspirations for next year...

Currently we are discussing two pilot programs with Shalom Hartman Institute of North America:

First—expanding access to the biggest questions facing Jews, Judaism, and Israel through the creation of a new year-long fellowship. In conjunction with senior fellows at SHI, explore differences in society, American Judaism and Israeli Judaism, and the future of liberal democracy through the lens of traditional Jewish wisdom.

Second—creation of a new academic course on Social Justice, it's history, Jewish roots, development of the Social Justice cottage industry, American history of coalitions, breakdowns, internal fighting and hard-won successes.

Professional Team Torah learning—as we all open our heart, our minds, and our souls to becoming our greatest selves through Jewish wisdom, we have that much more to offer our students. As Aryeh ben David teaches, “[t]he ultimate purpose for Jewish wisdom is to put me in direct contact with the voice of my soul, to equip me to play my role in rebuilding paradise, to help me create a better me and a better future.” For the coming year, the Oregon Hillel professional team commits to regular Torah learning—seeking inspiration and wisdom to flourish so we can guide our students towards the same.



When Millard attended the University of Oregon, there were few Jewish students and no Hillel. He first encountered Hillel in law school at Indiana University, but he only attended a few holiday gatherings. His daughter, Andrea Weiss, who lives in Chicago with her husband and three

children, was very involved in Hillel at Loyola University.

Her experience inspired the couple to donate to the University of Washington Hillel and Oregon Hillel. UO is Millard's alma mater, so he was especially gratified to see the growth of support for Jewish students there.

"Over the years, I saw the chapter grow and the wonderful work being done," says Millard. "I told Andy I wanted to create a

fund that would sponsor something every year. He suggested Shabbat dinners. "Shabbat dinner is one of the better places for students to connect and to form relationships," says Millard. "Shabbat dinners are a great way for meeting people, and it is something very Jewish. Shabbat dinners were very appealing to me....We chose (to do) two."

The Winter Welcome Back Shabbat brings students together to celebrate the first Shabbat of winter term. Senior Shabbat is a special sendoff that includes seniors and their families who are in town for graduation. Millard says he hopes the couple's donation will inspire others to donate funds to further enrich Jewish experiences at Oregon Hillel.

"I am envious," says Millard. "I wish that had existed when I went to college."

...engaged active and open life experience



The phrase “home away from home” does not describe this Hillel experience, it is far beyond.

We think “community” does describes the value that Hillel provides. There is a structured independence, engaged active and open life experience that the Hillel House creates. And yes with that Hillel
